7-10 Reports

As always, Term 3 has been a very busy and productive term for learning and co-curricular activities at Strathfield Girls High School. The term ended on a celebratory note with the farewelling of Year 12 after thirteen years of primary and secondary education. On Tuesday, Year 12 had a picnic at the Botanical Gardens and on Wednesday the final assembly was greatly enjoyed by all students and staff. Then on Thursday evening Year 12, their parents and staff attended the Year 12 Graduation at which there were formal acknowledgements of the girls' contributions and achievements at Strathfield Girls High School. All girls take with them the very best wishes of the whole school for a satisfying and productive engagement with the next stage of their lives.

It is now time for Year 11 to begin their HSC courses. It is essential that both students and parents understand that HSC studies begin on Day 1 of Term 4 and that there may well be assessment tasks due in that term. Waiting until





2020 for an HSC mindset will disadvantage a student, whereas commitment from the outset will relieve the inevitable challenge of completing the HSC course. There is no substitute for steady hard work.

Highlights of Term 3 have included the immensely successful Multicultural Day festivities in Week 6. These included food and costumes from many cultures and concerts in which the girls enthusiastically participated. Languages Day was another highlight for Year 7 students who had the opportunity to see and hear performances of various kinds in the several languages taught at Strathfield Girls High School, which is a designated Languages High School.

Book week was celebrated with a talk by Randa Abdel-Fattah, a writer of fiction for adolescents. There was also an exhibition of Year 12 HSC Visual Arts major works. Year 12 HSC ESL students published their books, "My Story".

Year 8 and 10 students and parents had the opportunity to hear a great deal of information about the courses which are available for students to select in years 9 and 11. It is important to realize that some courses may not run, as the number of students choosing a course determines whether it is viable. Students have been notified of their courses for 2020.

Throughout the term a great range of activities continued. Students involved in the LAB Project also visited schools in Adelaide which are participating in the project.

Students from Strathfield Girls High School have been regularly visiting Marie Bashir Public School to mentor younger students in science learning to enhance their understanding and enjoyment of that subject.

This has proven beneficial to both the primary and secondary students. The Z Club which is sponsored by Zonta, the public speaking group, went on an excursion to Brisbane, which they greatly enjoyed.

History Faculty

On the 28th of August, Year 10 Elective History along with the Year 11 Ancient History cohort, accompanied by Ms Cardinale and Ms Creevey had the opportunity of visiting the Nicholson Museum at the University of Sydney in order to gain a deeper insight into the topics we are studying at school.

The artefacts at the Nicholson Museum heavily correlated to the ancient Egyptian, Greek and Roman civilisations that we study. We were able to see several rare and archaic artefacts such as Egyptian mummies, Roman statues and Greek pottery. They even had a scale replica of the town of Pompeii built entirely out of LEGO. The museum guide gave us detailed information on each of the artefacts, which added onto our understanding of ancient civilisations.

However, not only were we able to see these interesting artefacts for ourselves, we were able to have a hands on experience with several artefacts that they had located in a storage room. Year 10 HSC Minimum Standard Literacy and Numeracy groups





This year the Learning & Engagement faculty has continued with their intensive literacy program to support students in Year 10 to succeed in the HSC Minimum Standards Test.

Students work in targeted areas of Writing and Numeracy to prepare for the online test in term 3 &4.

Ms. Logan and Mrs. Taylor from the Learning & Engagement faculty provide small, specialised writing tutorials, while Dr Eklund meets regularly with identified students in Year 10 to prepare them to sit the HSC Minimum Standard numeracy test.

During Term 2 -4 these teachers are running small tutoring groups. Each teacher is familiar with the test's marking criteria and how that criteria will be implemented so they can best support the students in the tutorial groups.

Before students join a tutoring group, their HSC Minimum Standard test results and school marks are examined, so that the lessons can be tailored to meet the students' specific needs. The groups are capped at six to eight students, to enable individual support.

The tutorials are scheduled around important events, assessment tasks and exams. They run weekly so that each student can build their skills as quickly as possible. Our progress assessments are showing that, most students are gaining the skills they need to achieve the required level 3 or level 4 in the HSC Minimum Standard test.
